### CIVIL DEFENSE – THE SUPERIOR TECHNOLOGY

As we have repeatedly stated, we are as strongly in favor of *strategic* defense deployment for America as we are of *civil* defense deployment. Research has clearly shown that in the face of the current Soviet threat, the most effective defense which can be deployed involves approximately equal expenditures on civil and strategic defense.

If expenditures are minimal, this situation becomes distorted. For example, in the case of almost no money, the most effective action is to provide a copy of *Nuclear War Survival Skills* to every American and hope for the best. FEMA could, of course, do that now – even with its small budget.

If we would just divert six months of our current military budget to these objectives, we could quickly build an overwhelmingly effective antimissile and anti-aircraft strategic defense and shelter and food reserve civil defense system. Such a system would almost surely deter any attack on America in the near term.

But what about the future? What about chemical weapons, biological weapons, terrorist and covert delivery of nuclear weapons, and other technologies which may not require delivery by large numbers of airplanes or missiles? What about radioactive fallout from a small nuclear war in the Middle East or Asia where more and more unpredictable regimes are acquiring nuclear weapons?
